Dear Fellow Residents,

Last week the BBC celebrated the 80th anniversary of 'Desert Island Discs'. The programme has, throughout that time, been a mainstay of the radio. First broadcast on 29th January, 1942 it has clocked up more than 3000 episodes. The list of castaways is impressive, featuring individuals associated with the arts, politics, business and the world of entertainment.

The format of the programme is relatively simple. The guest is invited to imagine that they will be castaway on a desert island. To help pass the time they are asked to choose eight pieces of music, a book and a luxury. The music usually has an association with moments in their lives that are important to them. The books range from manuals and compendiums to a novel they would wish to read again or one that they have never got round to reading. As for the luxury there have been many diverse choices including a pillow, a toothbrush, a piano and a limitless supply of wine.

As a youngster the whole idea of being marooned on a desert island fascinated me. It was something I encountered when I read 'Robinson Crusoe' and 'The Swiss Family Robinson'. The idea of retrieving essential items from a shipwreck and foraging for anything to survive fired the imagination. Eventually reality kicked in, I realised that I didn't possess the skills required and I wouldn't be able to cope with the loneliness on a long term basis.

Isolation is something that we have all encountered during the last couple of years. Some have coped with it better than others. For some it may have had novelty value initially, providing the opportunity to slow the pace of life pursuing long neglected hobbies and enjoying exercise on a regular basis. However, for many the novelty soon wore off and the monotony of isolation kicked in. Over the months we began to long for face to face contact with family and friends. Eventually after several setbacks we were able to entertain, go to the cinema and visit a favourite restaurant. Progress has been slow but it does appear that things are on the mend.

The hall is open again for classes and activities; also a number of events are in the diary. Scottish Opera appeared in February and was a great success, a Murder, Mystery evening will take place in March and we plan to host a concert with the Aberdeen Strathspey and Reel Society in May. Hopefully these events will help our community as we collectively attempt to make isolation a thing of the past.

Closure of Comers – Glenwood Foot Bridge

Since the last edition of the newsletter was published several people have volunteered materials, tools, practical and physical assistance to rebuild the Comers side approach to the foot bridge over the burn. What a great community response and much appreciated but we now have to “GET IT DONE”!



As many volunteers as could manage came to a general planning meeting at the Men's Shed recently and after much discussion we realised that there is never a right time for the closer, unfortunately someone will always be inconvenienced.

The temporary repairs affected last summer are holding up well but the supporting structure is gradually failing so, when the weather starts to warm up and the days get longer, we shall get on with it. We have decided to make a start on Saturday 26th March so that we have as much time as we need in the following week to complete what needs to be done. We hope that the work will take no more than four days all together.

To all bridge users please expect the wooden foot bridge over Comers burn to be:-

CLOSED between Saturday 26th and Wednesday 30th March

We also agreed that if the weather is completely against us the fall-back date to start would be 2nd April but that we sincerely expect that this is unlikely. It would have to be deep snow or blasting gales to stop us although given the amount of wind we have had in the last few months maybe this is possible!



Notification signage will go up on the approaches to the bridge at least a week before hand as to exactly when things will happen; we will also circulate information on Nextdoor, using Plastic Post and on the notice boards around the village.

As a long-standing resident of Midmar, I have experienced a variety of weather phenomena, over the years, snow-storms, blizzards, incessant rain and drought. To be endured, although maybe not enjoyed.

Storm Arwen, which hit us in late November 2021, was however perhaps the most frightening of all in its ferocity and in terms of the damage wrought to property, forests, and power supplies. 
The local landscape is altered forever with woodland paths blocked by log jams, unless the experience of a natural assault course is desired.

Does Your Family Have a Similar Medal?

Andy Martin, who lives at Mill of Kinnernie, recently came across the medal shown in these photographs whilst going through his historical family papers. Andy's grandfather was William Abernethy and he was born at Mains of Corsindae in 1893.



The medal is silver, about 35mm long and inscribed on one side with 'WA' his grandfather's initials. On the other side there is an inscription 'MIDMAR 1920' and **two crossed arrows**.

1920 is round about the time that William moved away from Midmar to take over a pharmacy business in Alness by Invergordon in Ross and Cromarty.



None of Andy's family knows anything about the history or significance of the medal so it is a mystery. Maybe it was awarded for some activity in Midmar or a contribution to the community, what might be the significance of the crossed arrows?

1. **the shoes are paired with a rubber band to make it easier to sort and pack.**
2. **the shoes are in relatively good condition – so no holes or broken soles please!**

**Your shoes can be handed in to the school
from Monday 21st February until Friday 19th March.**

ShoeShare is a campaign in partnership with UNICEF UK and Clarks Shoes.

The campaign collects old or unwanted shoes, which are sent for re-use. For every tonne of shoes collected, a donation is made to UNICEF UK which goes towards education programmes around the world.



The aim of **ShoeShare** is to reach even more children and improve their access to an education. More than 59 million children of primary school age are still not in education. This is just under the population of the UK. 

Historic Midmar

One of our readers, Michaela Marocchi, recently sent us a web link to an effusive article, written about Midmar in 1966, by the then P&J journalist Cuthbert Graham who was well known for his weekly travel column called *"This Is My Country"*. Another Newsletter reader, that I told about this article and has lived in Midmar all their lives, thought they maybe remembered it and might even have an original cutting of it somewhere! The P&J article is too big to re-print here in full but it did contain some interesting pictures and information that I have summarised, direct quotes from the article are highlighted using *"italics"*.

"Only 14 miles west of Aberdeen, A974, the Tarland road, enters the parish of Midmar, a little kingdom of enchantment in which nature and man have woven together a marvellous tapestry"

"We who live in the north-east are more fortunate. We can sample the noble prospects of Midmar with the greatest of ease. Come with me along the road which runs straight as a die through the village of Echt, past the old toll house, with the rounded hump of the Barmekin on your right and the long pineclad slopes of the Hill of Fare on your left."

A mile beyond the village of Echt, at the fourteenth milestone, we pass on our right the homely farm of Sunhoney. You can't see it from the main road, but on the tree-ringed height above the farmhouse, in the hummocky enclosure within a rough-stone dyke stands one of the grandest stone circles in Britain. With its huge recumbent stone of bluish-grey diorite, its jagged flankers and nine splendid pillars of Hill of Fare granite, it is one of the best-preserved monuments of its kind in the country."



Maybe in 1966 you had to hike across the field to reach this stone circle but today there is a fenced path behind Sunhoney farm to reach it quite easily.

The article goes on to describe various other historic buildings around Midmar, the Castle, Corsindae House, the New Kirk with its much more accessible stone circle, the Old Kirk and the mysterious mound just to the north of this

“and the great green mound of the Cunnigar Hill – on which a Norman fortress stood”

.... the present parish church is out of sight among its trees at the top of the hill, and the two main population centres – Midmar hamlet, with post office, parish hall and a sizeable cluster of houses below the fine new school opened in 1963, and the hamlet of Comers to the west, are away to the north.

The fact is that in the past 15 years [since 1950] Midmar has had quite a rejuvenation. Eight families have been housed in a fine group of County Council houses, many old farmhouses have been completely modernised, electricity has penetrated to the remotest corners of the parish, and farming has prospered.

The Forestry Commission, with a hamlet of its own at Craigshannoch on the slopes of the Hill of Fare, and a large acreage of plantations on the hill, has revitalised a whole sector along the southern borders.

Now that things have improved, we can take pride in Midmar as a parish where the whole story of human settlement, from the later Bronze Age to the present day, is attested by visible links with the past illustrating virtually every phase in 4,000 years of progress.”

One of the pictures in the article that I found most interesting was taken from the hill to the north east of Comers, you can just see the petrol pump outside the shop and bridge etcetera...



Midmar Community Cafe

Are you a Landlord?

The Scottish Government's Energy Efficiency Regulations for the Scottish Private Rented Sector (PRS) that were due to come into force in April 2022 have been further postponed due to Covid.

The original intent had been for properties to achieve an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) band D. The Government now intends to land regulations to require PRS properties to have an EPC Band C at tenancy change in 2025 and for all PRS properties to have an EPC Band C by 2028.
