#### Dear Fellow Residents,

### **Kemnay House- A Local Gem**

I have been living in this area for more than 20 years but have never visited Kemnay House which is so near to us. The original house was established in 1630 and is located to the east of the golf course, off the main road. This historic home is not easily visible when just passing by however the entrance is clearly identified by a discrete plaque on one of the gate pillars.

As you approach, the shape of the house gradually emerges through a gateway of trees, shrubs and rhododendrons that were not yet in full bloom in April. Views of the turret and older parts of the building are then revealed when approaching from the parking area.

This wonderful place is open **occasionally** during the summer so take a look at their website if you wish to visit, https://www.kemnayhouse.com.

Our tour guides provided a fascinating insight into the history of the family members and their lives. What struck me was the international stage that many of them lived and worked upon, including ambassadorial and cultural positions both at home and abroad. This is illustrated by photograph albums featuring faded sepia pictures from expeditions and life in Africa, including a picture of the first motor car being driven by a family member in India, if I remember correctly.



There are also a great many documents on display, copies of letters from different centuries, receipts, invoices, that provide a good sense of the life of the house and family. It is easy to look at portraits on the walls which are interesting but, it can still be a distant and disconnected experience yet, seeing a hand written letter or note to order a particular roll of wallpaper sample adds a significant personal dimension.



What made me swoon, as you might expect from a surface pattern designer, were the original wallpapers, the tapestries over the doors to keep out drafts, the fabrics. In the sitting room there is a beautiful court waist coat worn by Alexander Burnett, an Empire dress worn by Elizabeth Burnett (1788-1806) and a Victorian bustle dress.



The bedroom featured a stunning wedding dress. Also on display were exquisite lace baby bonnets which the family had found, seemingly forgotten, in a box in the library of all places especially odd when this was the room gentlemen retired to after dinner.

The library is small but stunning with beautiful original patterned

wallpaper and it houses around 3000 volumes of books, the majority of which were published before 1850. It was one

of the rooms created when the North East wing was being remodelled.



I love old books and I was particularly struck by one bookcase holding the ivory coloured collection of vellum

bound books, mostly in Latin, purchased by Thomas Burnett 2nd of Kemnay and his father.

Fascinating too were the stacks of faded, frayed copies in the darker corners of the room leaning against the walls like tall, narrow chimneys, some evoking a medieval look, the way they were stitch-bound and tied together with ribbons.

I would love to spend time browsing through them, as with the letters and



handwritten notes these books open a real connection and doorway to the past for me and my imagination. Another highlight in the library was a map that featured an etching of Dunnottar Castle before it turned into a ruin.

I am not so much into furniture however there

are many beautiful items, including writing desks and a stunning intricate inlaid

wooden Dutch tall freestanding clock at the top of the stairs and also this one (pictured) in the middle.

The tour concluded via the turret circular stair case with the offer of a cup of tea and homemade lemon drizzle cake in the panelled parlour which features beautiful decorative panels restored by Susan Burnett. For the past three generations artists have lived and worked here and it is great to see how the house is being utilised now to connect past and presentit certainly worked for me.

#### Plant 1000 trees in Midmar initiative



**Richard Fyffe** is organising the erection of a bonfire at the Trig Point (Triangulation Pillar) on the brow of the hill in the field by the Midmar Hall.

The beacon will be lit, weather permitting, on the evening of **Thursday 2nd June at 9.15pm** or very soon after. It is planned for all nearby beacons to be well



alight and visible by 9.45pm. The most obvious neighbouring beacon will be on Bennachie but there may well be others that become visible in the surrounding area.



All are welcome to attend but because there will be livestock in the field, leave dogs at home on this occasion. The gate into the field with the shortest access to the trig point over the rough ground will opened. To reach this walk from the Hall carpark to the bend in the road as highlighted by the blue arrow on the insert map.

### Tillybirloch — Windblow Update

Following the extensive winter storm damage regretfully it is taking a considerable time to plan the inevitable clear-fell of what remains of Tillybirloch Wood. Much of the timber is Scots Pine which has succumbed to blue stain, since being windblown.

For your own safety I would ask that everyone stays clear of the woodland meantime because many of the standing trees have been weakened or are propped by others and it won't take much to bring them down unexpectedly.

The harvesting of trees will happen as soon as a contractor becomes available and the emergency felling licence, which has been applied for, is in place. At this stage I cannot give a definite date for the work because as you can imagine all the local contractors continue to be extremely busy.


In due course the whole area will be replanted, incorporating a new planting scheme complete with a sensible path layout.

### On Our Farm - Summer 2022

In recent months the arable and livestock farmers around Midmar have been preparing the land, sowing crops, calving and lambing. After that brief period when the weather was warm at the end of March, the spring snows and cold northerly winds that followed delayed planting plans but in May we have been catching up.

snack of neeps, straight from the ground, but soon they will be grazing on fresh grass. Now we are looking forwards to the summer, which is when the growing crops are tended, before they are harvested, stored or sold on.



June is when we start the process of making Silage and Hay. A good period of dry weather is needed to cut the grass that will become Hay once it has

dried. Hay is stored as bales.



It can be wetter for the Silage harvest. Silage is animal fodder made from preserved green foliage crops, around Midmar this is usually After we have cut the grass, on our grass. farm, we place it into a pit and cover it to

exclude oxygen so that it will start to ferment, this preserves it until we need it later in the year to feed to the animals.

The alternative to using a Silage pit is to create those large tightly packed cylindrical bales you often see in the fields wrapped in plastic which excludes oxygen and this stimulates the fermentation. The baling method creates a problem later on however disposing of the plastic.

July is not so hectic, all animals will be out to graze but still inspections out in the fields every day are important to check for lameness or illness. If we do discover problems then the animals need to be caught and treated accordingly. All drug administration is recorded with drug name, dose, withdrawal period and ear number of animal. The local Echt Show (9<sup>th</sup> July this year) is a time for "fairmers ti get tae gither ti compete and hae a dram and a blether, get aff their wellies and boiler suits, forget all the problems for a day!!"

Come August our grain drying stores will be thoroughly cleaned. We will be keenly watching the weather hoping for the promise of a reliable warm and dry period to start the harvest, the winter sown barley will be first and then the spring sown crop follows, normally in late August or September. Once gathered in, all is then stored and dried.

If we have to harvest the barley in wet weather the moisture content can be as high as 25% and we need to reduce this to about 14% without overheating it, wet grain may go mouldy when stored.

From our harvest we retain what we need as seed for the next year and the rest is sold or used as cattle feed.

The barley we sell goes to Maltsters to make Whisky and Beer however only some varieties are suitable for this purpose and the buyers will test the grain before we ship it to ensure the majority will germinate. What then remains of our barley crop is used as cattle feed in the winter and spring, bruised of course, not whole grain. The bruising process cracks open the grains so that the nutritious kernel is exposed, the broken husk is retained in the feed as roughage.

As illustrated by these pictures the method of collecting in the harvest has changed hugely in the last

### The History of Comers Footbridge

A few years ago Comers footbridge users started to notice that the treads were breaking, especially on the Comers side. Nobody we asked knew who was responsible for the bridge, who built it or why multiple tread failures had suddenly started, a real mystery!

For the past eight years we have been patching the structure up with larch pieces donated by Richard Fyffe. However at the end of March the Comers side of the bridge was completely renewed and while we were doing the work we were visited by Gordon Adam. Gordon is now 85 and retired more than 10 years but it turns out that it was his grandfather who built the original bridge, probably before the first world war, more than 100 years ago.



Gordon's grandfather was Robert Elrick, a joiner who served his apprenticeship in Banchory, walking to and from Banchory over Hill of Fayre every week. On completion of his apprenticeship, grandfather started a joinery business based at Nether Shiels. Gordon's father (William Adam from Ordhead) was apprenticed to Robert Elrick and of course met and married Jeannie Elrick, daughter of his boss.

The first footbridge was a single span but this design was not strong enough to withstand a high spate and at some point it was washed away. His grandfather was then commissioned to replace the first structure with the dog leg design that we see today. This reduces the span lengths and utilises the rocks at the edge and middle of the stream for extra support when the water rises. Gordon's father and grandfather both maintained the bridge as required up until about 30 years ago when Gordon himself was commissioned to replace the bridge.

At the bridge re-opening a ceremony this picture recorded the moment, from left to right the people in the foreground are:

- John McGregor (Councillor)
- Gordon Adam (Bridge Builder)
- Alice, Virginia & Richard Fyffe
- Mrs Fordyce (last shop owner)
- Kevin Adam (assisted Gordon)
- Mavis Wainman (Councillor)
- Commander Wilson (Kebbaty)



So mystery solved! The Fyffe family almost certainly paid for the original bridge(s) to be built, it was then rebuilt circa 1990 by Gordon and probably paid for by the community council. During all that time the Elrick and Adam families have quietly maintained the bridge until Gordon retired a few years ago.

These highlights are reported from the meeting of Cluny, Midmar and Monymusk Community Council held on the **20th of April 2022** at Cluny Church Hall.

### Seasonal Veggie Tray Bake

This is an incredibly versatile dish and can be adjusted to suit the seasons.

As a main course the veggie tray bake is light yet filling at the same time. For extra protein add cubed goats cheese, feta, or sliced grilled Halloumi before serving. For the extra hungry, a side dish of lentils or grains would go well with it too, alternatively, the veggies can be eaten as a side accompaniment for any meat or fish course.

Serves: 2 — Cooking time: 30 mins

#### Ingredients:

- 1 small pumpkin, peeled, deseeded and cut into chunks
- 1 large sweet potato, peeled and cut into thick wedges
- 2 regular potatoes, peeled and cut into thick wedges
- 2 peppers (any colour), deseeded and cut into chunky slices
- 1 large courgette, thickly sliced
- 2 onions, cut into chunks
- 3 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- ½ tbsp whole grain mustard (more if you like mustard)
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 tbsp lemon juice
- 200ml chicken or veggie stock
- Salt & pepper
- Handful of fresh parsley roughly chopped



**Tip:** If using different vegetables, depending on the season, always make sure that the hard or root vegetables go in for the first 10 minutes.

#### Method:

- 1. Preheat standard oven to 220C or 200C with fan.
- 2. In a bowl mix pumpkin, sweet potato and potatoes with 1 tbsp olive oil and seasoning then transfer the mix to a roasting tin and put into the oven for 10 mins.
- 3. In a bowl mix together onions, peppers, courgette, chopped garlic with 1 tbsp olive oil, whole grain mustard, lemon juice and seasoning. Mix well to coat evenly.
- 4. Add this to the pumpkin potato mix once these have cooked for 10 mins, making sure all veggies are spread into a single layer.
- 5. Pour in enough chicken stock to cover the base of the roasting tin. Depending on size you may not need all the stock.

Roast for a further 20 minutes or until the veggies are lightly browned/ caramelised and cooked. Then Scatter over the chopped parsley and serve.

### Winter becomes Spring

Since November we have experienced a succession of wintry storms, bringing devastating winds and now [in February] blizzards, to a part of these small Isles, which is one of the first land masses



downwind of the ferocity of prevailing Atlantic westerlies.

This particular one which was dignified by a name, Storm Eunice, brought heavy snowfall, in this area, which effectively stopped many in their tracks, and will no doubt take some time to recover from.



Of course, many will see this snow fall as a 'plus'. It will no doubt replenish local water supplies and nourish crops. Apart from that, there is beauty to be found in the crystalline landscape. The structure and form of tree, branch and twig is emphasized by its snowy coverlet.

As Aristotle said, "To appreciate the beauty of a snowflake, it is necessary to stand in the cold".

Without a doubt, this latest 'fall' will have brought, at the very least inconvenience, delays to communications, services, logistics, and possibly in the wild animal and avian world, loss of life. Nevertheless, this phenomenon is part and parcel of seasonal change, possibly exacerbated in intensity, some would say, by climate change. .....Continued...

**Two** major storms in a week may have come as a shock, but trouble has been brewing for some time.

The Pacific around the equator is in the throes of La Niña, when the

seas turn cooler than normal towards South America. Even though thousands of miles away, La Niña often brings a wet and windy end to winter in the UK, with a powerful jet stream driving depressions across the Atlantic and as the core of the jet stream powered to more than 200mph this week, Storm Eunice rapidly exploded into a ferocious\_storm. Not only that, but the vortex of winds whirling around in the stratosphere high above the Arctic are unusually strong this winter, helping drive westerly weather across the Atlantic.'

To paraphrase Yoko Ono – 'Winter is about endurance'.

We can hope though, that:
"No winter lasts forever; No spring skips its turn'. - Hal Borland.

### Are you a Landlord?

The Scottish Government's Energy Efficiency Regulations for the Scottish PRS (*Private Rented Sector*) that were due to come into force in April 2022 have been further postponed due to COVID-19 constraints.

The original intent had been for properties to achieve an EPC (*Energy Performance Certificate*) band D by April 2022. The Government now intends to land regulations that require PRS properties to have an EPC Band C, at tenancy change in 2025 and for all PRS properties to have an EPC Band C by 2028.

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
