

Dear fellow residents.

Over the course of the last few months there have been a number of programmes, on both radio and television, commemorating the hundredth anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War. Among these have been dramas concentrating on life in the trenches, nursing at the front and issues relating to conscientious objection. Some have been better than others. Personally speaking, the programme which moved me most was on the radio. It consisted of extracts from letters and diaries written by serving soldiers. Not only did they write about life at the front, they also wrote about their hopes for the future and the brave new world they sought to create.

Recently I have given some thought to aspects of the Great War and how things have changed since then. One hundred years is a long time, yet within the lifespan of a growing number of people. What, I wonder, would those who perished make of the world that we now inhabit? Not in terms of technology and invention but with regard to issues such as war and peace, discrimination and equality. Would they think that we have done our bit to help create a better world?

One thing is for sure. They would undoubtedly still recognise the city, town or village that they left behind. No doubt the landscape will have changed during the course of a hundred years. Some buildings having been replaced by newer models, roads now winding their way through former fields and settlements and a plethora of windmills, radio masts and satellite dishes catching the eye from every direction.

Yet much remains and would be instantly recognisable. Among the buildings which have stood the test of time here in Midmar is the village hall. Through the years its appearance has been altered by a number of extensions and improvements. Yet I am certain that those who celebrated its opening over a hundred years ago would recognise it still. Throughout its long history countless individuals have served as committee members and we should rejoice at the years they gave to the hall and the community. Their efforts are our legacy.

Times change but some things are constant. Within our community the hall has stood the test of time. From the beginning its doors have been open to everyone whatever their age, gender or background. With your help and support the present hall committee will do their utmost to ensure that legacy continues to be nurtured.





I do like the idea you've borrowed a cute child (aka Alfie Wade) to finish the whole celebrity lifestyle, albeit Midmar stylie!






The Midmar Players are just getting started on their next production which will be 'Robin Hood'.

I would like to introduce myself. I am Elspeth McKay and I am the new Minister at Midmar Parish Church. I will have met some of you, but not others, but if you do see me about please do introduce yourself as I am keen to meet as many people as possible! I am new to the area but have been living in Aberdeen and Aberdeenshire for some sixteen years. Latterly we lived in Aberdeen, in Bucksburn, right by the airport. But

our own house is in a village called Forgue which is about seven miles from Huntly – so I am used to living in the country. I have moved here with my husband, David who works at the University of Aberdeen and our son William who is 9 years old (nearly 10) who has just started at Echt School. We also have a dog (well I collect him tomorrow) who is a black Labrador called Snipe, a cat called Astrid, two rabbits who are Augustine and Benedict and we are soon to be joined by two ducks, called Moby Duck and White Duck. So it is a very busy household!

Christmas services this year will be following more or less the familiar pattern. However, the Family Christmas Eve service will be slightly different. This year we are having a Christingle Service for all the family. What is a Christingle? A Christingle is an orange which is decorated with a red ribbon, cocktail sticks, raisins and sweets with a candle in the middle. Each of these has a special meaning, pointing to an important truth about Christ. The candle represents Christ as the light of the world, the orange is the world, the ribbon is tied around the orange to symbolize God's love for everyone, the raisins represent God's

creation and the sweets the numerous blessings that we receive from God. We will make the Christingles at the service, and there will be traditional carols sung. It is a fun service – suitable for children and adults alike, all are very welcome.

Please do, if you can, join us for some of the Christmas services. There is something for everyone. There will be the familiar carols and maybe some new ones too. I might even be tempted to bring along Clopper the Christmas Donkey who can tell you all about the first Christmas from the view of the Donkey, that's if the greedy boy hasn't eaten too many carrots by then!

Walk up an Appetite (13) on Boxing Day

The hall will be open when we get back at midday for Mince Pies, Mulled wine and other Christmas nibbles, donations to cover the cost welcome on the day.


As last year, we will meet by the hall ready, to set off around 10:00 am on 26th December (that's a Friday). If you can, please let me (Rob Ferguson) know in advance if you are planning to come so we have an idea how many Mince Pies to get or just bring your own!

This walk starts at Midmar Hall so there is ample space to park or leave bikes; for people living along the route, you can easily join the path anywhere. Most of the route uses existing paths, tracks and roads but everyone in your group should have reasonable mobility because there is some rough ground and a wall to be crossed.

The length of the walk is 3.5 miles so it will probably take about 2 hours to complete.

 To start, head right (SW) out of the Hall car park downhill, on the metalled road towards Glenwood.



- 2) Just before Midmar school turn right (NW) passing the school playing field on your left.
- As you leave the metalled surface the route first becomes a track then a path, follow the route left and downhill to cross the Comers Burn in the valley via a foot bridge.



- 4) On the north side of the burn turn left (SW) and walk on the metalled road to the junction opposite the old Comers shop and new sign board.
- 5) At the junction by the bridge in Comers turn right (NW) to walk up hill out of Comers and continue for about 0.75 mile, past the site of the old snow plough station by Carsluchie Wood, Viewfield and Upper Kebbaty.
- 6) The turn right (ENE) off the metalled road, this vehicle track is clearly shown by house signs for both Ordiefork and Kebbaty. Follow this track for another 0.5 mile.
- 7) Shortly after passing Kebbaty Mains and Manse the trees on both sides of the vehicle track become similar depth. On your right you will come up to a broad field entrance, take this to walk into the field on your right (S) and then walk SE, diagonally across the field, heading towards the far corner. This route is fine in Autumn and Winter when the field is not growing a crop.



- In late Spring and Summer I suggest you take the alternative route shown in blue dashes on the map. For this, just continue on the vehicle track until just before the gatehouse where you turn right (SE) into the trees to enter the field and follow the edge as far as the point you can conveniently cross the low wall into the meadow.
- 8) At the field corner cross there is a short stretch of rough ground and a field gate that leads into the meadow land by the drainage ditch on the north side. Pass through the gate and to cross the ditch, follow this NE till you reach a point where it is covered. There is usually livestock in this meadow all year so ensure dogs are on their leads.
- Turn right to cross the ditch towards a break in the low wall and the path along the west side if the Comers Burn.
- 10) Pass through the farm gate and turn left (SE) to cross the burn on the concrete bridge.
- 11) At the "cross roads" follow the main vehicle track ahead walking slightly up slope.
- 12) Around the next bend there is a wooden farm gate to your right at the entrance to a grassy avenue known as "Green Lane". Pass through the gate to walk more steeply uphill now, heading SE.
- 13) At the top of Green Lane pass through another wooden gate and turn right (SW) to follow the vehicle track in the grass along the fence boundary. Again this field often has livestock in it and because of the curve of the hill they are often hidden from view so keep dogs on their leads until you are sure the field is not in use.
- 14) Staying inside the field boundary, turn left (SE) to walk up beside the hall car park fence where there is a metal farm gate to leave the field and by turning right for a few vards you are back at the hall.

The route map is not scaled so take OS Landranger Map 38, with you for additional reference information. The total area is enclosed by Eastings NJ65 to NJ69 and Northings NJ07 to NJ09. 
