#### Where Have All Our Paths Gone - Part 2

Since the article in the last newsletter there has been a lot of discussion about what the Midmar community could do to re-instate paths in the Midmar area. An exciting new development at Bogindhu woodland is that the Fountains Forestry (the Management Company) has given tacit agreement for local residents to create a new woodland path. Also the Community Council is currently considering an application for funding support to Aberdeenshire Council to cover any practical costs that might arise to improve access throughout the area.

Comers Bridge is probably top of the list for many people, and we have been told that this is recognised as a priority by the Community Council and that they are chasing this up as an urgent matter. Since the last conversation with councillors, one of the walking boards has broken and many others are showing signs of serious rot, so urgent repairs are needed. Aberdeenshire Council has identified the path from Glenwood Cottages to Comers as the only "core path" in Midmar. We are hoping that this status will help make sure the necessary funds are made available.

We have also been in touch with Aberdeenshire Council regarding the blockage caused by rubble dumped in the middle of the historic right of way from **Midmar Kirk to Balblair**. The rubble was dumped last year (picture) and appears to have been added to recently. We are awaiting feedback from Aberdeenshire Council about how to deal with this problem.

At **Tillybirloch** we have discussed with landowners and users about improving access along the traditional route to the woods.

Finally, it is some time since the padlocked gate at **Mains of Shiels**, on the route up from Nether Shiels,



was first referred to the council. The good news is that it has been left unlocked for the last few months. We hope it will remain unlocked because it is quite a heave for bicycle users taking the shorter and safer route to Millbank, quite aside from being an obstacle to everyone else using the route.

At **Bogindhu**, local residents are hoping to create a new path around the woodland using volunteers' labour over the summer, in a sociable and fun sort of way. The initial aim is to clear the southerly loop and crossing path from the road entrance to Hillhead. Dates proposed for working parties (for the Hall Garden, Bogindhu and others) are 14<sup>th</sup> & 21<sup>st</sup> June, 26<sup>th</sup> July, 16<sup>th</sup> August, 13th & 27<sup>th</sup> September. #### Walk up an Appetite (15)

Hail, rain and chill winds today, regardless it is summer time, so this walk is higher and longer than usual to stay away from fields where crops are growing and young livestock are at pasture, it also takes in one of the best local views from the summit of Green Hill.


#### Guided Walk – Sunday 5th July, starting at 11:00.

We will start from the parking in the trees by Ewens Croft (third mile beyond Baudygaun) with the aim of having a snack on the way round at a convenient point and finish by midafternoon. Please let me know in advance if you are coming so we can run a proper head count and arrange sensible alternate parking if necessary.

Although most of the route is on well-made tracks there is a rough ascent to the top of Green Hill so everyone must have good mobility, preferably a walking stick for balance and robust footwear is essential.

The length of the walk is about 5 miles so allow at least three hours to complete it.

- To reach the start of the walk, turn west off the B993 towards Baudygaun, Tolmauds and Ennets, passing the main forest road entrances for Correnie Forest to stop at the track marked Ewens Croft, Upperhill and Denwell.. There is ample parking off the road in the trees at the start of this well maintained track.
- After about quarter of a mile you will come up to a fork, take the left hand route towards Denwell but allow some time to admire the magnificent cast iron letter box for Upperhill farm.
- 3) Pass through Denwell farmyard continuing uphill onto what is signed Bridgeview Road! This leads to more farm buildings and an uninhabited cottage at Forkins of Midmar. Again go through this farmyard continuing uphill.



4) 20 yards after passing through the metal gate, painted blue, turn immediate right (NE) on to a lesser vehicle track, this will lead you across the field where the remains of a stone circle are on your right. The depression of the circle is clearly visible in the ground and there are some minor stones on the south side. It is a magnificent spot to take an early break for those who have time. After this, head north into the adjacent field when you leave the stone circle.minor stones on the south side. It is a magnificent spot to take an early break for those who have time. - 5) The obvious route across the rough meadow (N) and into the trees (shown on the OS map) is blocked by young plantation so I turned right (E) to walk parallel with the tree line field border.
- 6) Exit the field at the gate (SE corner) that will open but is difficult to close so it is probably best to hop over it at the hinge end. Then turn left (N) to walk up the field border, the farmer has left a sensible width without ankle twisting boulders strewn so it is easy walking. At the next field edge cross into the rougher ground, this traditional field fence has plain

At the next field edge cross into the rougher ground, this traditional field fence has plain wire on the top strand so it can do its job without being a hazard to those stepping over it.

- After crossing the fence, first head East (right) and then North inside the fence line until you reach the wall that you will see in the distance. There are numerous animal tracks to use.
- 7) At the corner of the field wall look carefully to the NE, look for the single tree in the middle of the slope going up to the ridge of Green Hill, ignore the obvious ones that breach the skyline.
  - Set off towards the single tree (approx. OS ref NJ 6311 0997) which can be reached walking primarily on tussocky grass and occasionally damp ground.
- 8) Between the tree and the top of the slope (Green Hill ridge) the ground is covered with heather, however it is even underfoot so not difficult walking, it is just a slog because it is uphill and there is no obvious path.
- Pick up the summit track and turn right (SE) to walk towards what is the highest point of Green Hill.
- 10) Do not take the first turn (S) off the hill but proceed to pass the single (stunted) Christmas tree and head down the hill (E then S) on an obvious track.
- 11) Having entered the trees on both sides you reach a vehicle turning point with green container in the trees, carry on south leaving the container on your left.
- 12) When you come up to a track fork, with a quarry area on your left (E), take the right hand

branch to carry straight on down slope (S) following the lesser track.

13) After about 300 paces start watching carefully for a turn off to the right (W), (if you reach more open ground you have gone too far). The inset picture shows what you are looking for. Once you have turned on to it, the path is obvious and well used but gradually narrows down to be single file walking

14) For those walking this route "in reverse" this narrow path starts just before the track to Upperhill farm crosses the burn. For those



walking clockwise turn left (S) when you reach the Upperhill farm track and walk out (S) to re-join the route that leads back to the start.

Please take OS Landranger Maps 37 with you for additional reference information. The total area is enclosed by Eastings NJ62 to NJ64 and Northings NJ08 to NJ11. #### Nature in the Raw

'A garden is a lovesome thing- God wot'. Thomas Edward Brown 1830-1897

I have been fortunate to spend most of my adult life in an attractive rural part of Scotland, and to have had the opportunity to create a garden, over the last twenty years. This has not exactly been an endeavour which would emulate the skills of 'Capability Brown'; perhaps culpability would be a more apposite epithet. However, despite my best efforts, trees, perennials and shrubs, many of which are self -set, including the ubiquitous ash trees, have thrived-, and copses, shrubberies, lawns and borders planted long ago are now attaining maturity, and provide a habitat to sustain the livelihood of many birds and other indigenous creatures. As such, I have been in a position to gain some insights into their natural life cycles, at fairly close quarters. Occasionally I am privileged to have a vignette of their tenuous existence.

The arrival of Spring signals rejuvenation, plant growth, and considerable activity within the wild avian and animal populations. After the privations and sub-zero temperatures of the winter season, when most creatures are in semi hibernation or 'survival mode', many creatures, great and small, are invigorated by the bourgeoning temperatures, and the renaissance of greenery, to start attracting their counterparts for mating and reproduction. Spring heralds new life.

It is fascinating to observe the mating rituals of the native wood pigeons in my garden- the nodding and touching of heads, the display of plumage, and the chase by the male seemed vaguely reminiscent of human sexual behaviours. Many birds in my immediate vicinity are embarked upon the process of nest building. Wagtails have taken up residence in the stone wall outside my study, the blackbirds in the heart of the juniper bush, well protected by the prickly branches. It is to be hoped that they will raise their offspring to maturity and avoid predators, or destruction of their environment during this brief time. I have, in the past, witnessed the despoliation of nests, broken eggs, and worse, but happily many fledglings survive.

Sadly, in recent times, oystercatchers are not much in evidence - apart from distant sightings. Traditionally they have nested in rough pasturage in an adjacent field, but they are conspicuous by their absence. Is this attributable, one wonders, to 'development' or 'improved agricultural practices' adding fertilizer and pesticides to the land? For many years their shrill dawn cry as they wheel around the house, has been a harbinger of spring.

They have raised their sole offspring in my 'backyard', and I have witnessed the anxious ministrations of doting parents as they watched over their vulnerable offspring, alternating custodial roles in their search for sustenance for the chick. One year, I witnessed their nest being

attacked, successfully, by crows, who, mounting a tactical diversionary ploy, swooped down for the kill. Nature in the raw can be fairly brutal, and the chances of survival of many young creatures, appears to be slim- frogs being a case in point. One day, after heavy rain, there were large accumulations of frogspawn in a newly created puddle. The next day a



dessicated patch of ground had taken its place- the nurturing environment for the new life destroyed by the forces of nature.

The observation of these forces of nature at work, over many seasons, creates within me the impression of the precariousness of existence for these creatures, particularly those without nurturing parents. Nevertheless, in so far as I am sentient of the reproductive patterns of many local creatures, I am inclined to be in awe of the processes unfolding each year in front of me. Scientific

explanations notwithstanding, I find it miraculous- a 'Mysterium tremendum et fascinans'- that that their reproductive processes allow creatures to produce offspring in their own likeness. Is this due to accident, as evolutionary theorists might suggest, or due to 'Intelligent Design?'

I am not alone in thinking along these lines. In the article, 'Evolutionary Theories in Gender an Sexual Reproduction' 2003, the authors (Harrub and Thompson) question evolutionary perspectives on the development and maintenance of sex. They postulate that sex (the reproductive process involving a male and female ,in case we have forgotten!) is neither a historical accident.....nor a product of organic evolution itself, but rather the product of an 'Intelligent Creator'.

Each individual may come to develop their own view on this ontological matter. While not appraised of the genetic complexities involved in the ongoing cycle of reproduction, my own nascent beliefs, based upon a lifetime of observation of the life cycles of creatures, human and otherwise. increasingly incline me to be persuaded by the 'Intelligent Design' theory. A fairly controversial subject perhaps, and one which is not easily verifiable. Are we all part of a 'Grand Plan'- and not just for our gardens, I wonder? Faith Mackenzie 2015
