Dear fellow residents,

Like many others I have been overcome by the images on television these last few days, of the fires raging out of control at Fort Mc Murray in Canada. It was an awesome experience, watching people fleeing for their lives as everything they possessed was consumed by the flames. In all over 80,000 residents lost their homes and belongings and are desperately seeking temporary accommodation.

It reminded me of an exercise I employed in the classroom to help pupils engage with each other. They were asked to imagine that their home was about to be destroyed by a disaster and that they had just a few minutes to save one item. Their task was to identify that item and to explain why it was worth saving. Over the years a variety of answers were given, ranging from computers and mobile phones to games and cuddly toys. One of the zaniest answers I received was from a girl who lived with her granny. She said that she would save her granny's teapot. When asked why, she answered, my granny says she can't do anything until she's had a cup of tea'.

Were disaster to hit our community, I wonder what we would choose to save, apart from our homes? What is there to save? What is worth saving? I'm quite certain that some would say the school, others the church and perhaps others would mention the hall. However, that's about it

We no longer have a shop and the pub has gone, although many are doing their best to secure a future for the building.

Yet some communities have even less than we have. A few years ago the local press highlighted the plight of several North East communities who were desperately trying to save their village halls. I recently read of the efforts taking place in the village of Matterdale in Cumbria to raise awareness regarding their community's lack of a hall. On Saturday16th May they officially launched their campaign with the creation of a "Virtual Village Hall'. They have erected a marquee in the village and it will remain on site throughout the summer to host a number of events as the residents explore the possibilities of a new community facility. Sometimes we don't appreciate what we have and just how lucky we are. We have a hall and it has served our community for 111 years. Through the years it has been refurbished, been subjected to ongoing repairs and been a source of frustration to one hall committee after another. Yet it has endured. It is our legacy from those who have gone before us. Should we not do our utmost to ensure that legacy continues to the benefit of those yet to come?

The headline news for Bogindhu Woodland, is that since the last Newsletter was published, the people who came along last Saturday (21st May) completed opening up the route to the north boundary of the woodland in a final two hours. After this amazing


achievement here we are enjoying a well-earned sausage sandwich (or maybe two) as a celebration in a kitchen somewhere in the North Tillydaff area!

These were of course just the last men standing, there have been many others who have come along over the winter to help battle through some very thick gorse, clear wire, chop back protruding branches and smooth out lumps. Thank you to everyone who



has contributed along the way both in effort and in kind, at least one set of super lopper jaws gave way to the undergrowth!

Other news is that Fountains Forestry have just told us that after a six month delay things will start to move again very soon. The crossing track to Hillhead is to be re-instated and probably another North/South track created. They may even finish what we have started



on the old crossing track from Meikle Midmar to Bogindhu Farm and clear this gorse too. Good luck to them in that task!

When this work is finished they will be restocking the trees over the whole area and this should all be complete by August. We can then erect some signage to help direct people using the routes.

The inset map shows what we hope will be passable walking routes at Bogindhu by Autumn.

In other news, the route over from school to Tillybirloch has been improved again, our thanks go to Gordon Walker for getting the enormous boulders lying in the track removed.

I would imagine that most of you will have seen the old Kirk of Midmar when driving from Echt to Midmar. Sometimes it is difficult to spot it when driving in summer as the trees make it difficult to see. The Old Kirk was built in the latter half of the 17th century and was dedicated to Saint Nidan. It is supposed to have been built on a much earlier Medieval Church and could also have been the site of the first Christian Church or Chapel in the area which would have been built at some point in the seventh century. There has been,

however, a spiritual centre of Midmar for much longer than that, with the presence of the stone circle which was constructed during the Bronze Age.

St Nidan is not one of the most well known of saints. He was a priest from Wales in the 6th and 7th centuries who lived at a monastery at Penmon on Anglesey and established a church there at what is now known as Llanidan in around 616AD. We are not too sure about how Nidan found himself in Scotland. It is thought that he was one of the many monks who travelled with St Kentigern (also known as St Mungo) from North Wales to Scotland. Together with another of the travelling Monks, St Finan, St Nidan was said to have established Christianity in Midmar and had the first Church dedicated to him. That really is all we know about St Nidan and how and why the first Church in Midmar was dedicated to him.

The Church that we see by the side of the road today was built in 1677 and was deserted in 1789 when the new Church, the one we use today, was built near to the original spiritual centre of Midmar.

Many churches are dedicated to saints, usually a local saint. But why and what does it mean to be a saint? From a brief look at the nature of a saint, we can see that a saint is someone who is different, someone who shows us how to love God. They are not perfect people though. Saint Peter was very inconsistent and Saint Paul could be arrogant and lose his temper at short notice. Saints John and James revelled in their position in life, the defects in the saints go on. But, they all have one thing in common, saints are those who have made a difference because they tried to love and serve God and to love and serve God's world.

You do not have to be famous or in the Bible to be a saint. Saints are all around us, they are those who have inspired us to love God. They are our grandparents, our parents, brothers and sisters, friends. But we are saints too. We have been called to be God's hands and feet in the world, to be God's presence in the world, here and now.

I read somewhere that 'the only tragedy in life is to die and not have become a saint'.

Have a good summer and do drop in to St Nidan's if you can, it's well worth a visit. Elspeth



Walk up an Appetite (19)


For a long time I have wanted to investigate walking at the west end of Hill of Fayre, south of the Learney cross roads, the sun was shining so I went out to investigate today.

This is a varied circular walk, starting at one of the many disused quarries in that area where there is spacious off road parking, the other option is to park where the track from Dunswell comes down to the road (7 on my inset map) and start the walk there if you prefer to finish with an easy descent.

The length of the walk is about 3.5 miles, but has several ascents and descents so it will probably take you 3 hours to complete. Most of the route follows forest and metaled roads but there is a lumpy and wet grassy section walking from 2 to 6 on the inset map through the mature woodland to Dunswell, so make sure you have good footwear.

The walk starts at the disused quarry off the B993 that is now a car park and is located opposite one of the tracks leading to Learney House, Grid Ref NJ65080 04745.

- Head south out of the car park following the forest road through Turk Wood for 0.4 mile and then
 on the continuing on this road it swings more left (SE) as you crest the 2nd rise, continue for
 another 0.4 mile.
- 2) The forest road ends with a turning circle, continue across this but <u>DO NOT</u> pass between the two gate posts at the other side, turn right (SW) before you reach them, keeping the fence on your left, to find a vague vehicle track in the grass that becomes increasingly more distinct as you progress.



At the same time as investigating this walk I also explored what happens North and East after going through the fence posts beyond the turning circle. Going North the vehicle track cannot have seen wheels for over 40 years but it is still passable on foot and you can get to Tillenhilt and Auchorie bridge if you choose, hence (I assume) the

- name on the map for this route being "Cross of Fare". If you continue East you find a good footpath through the heather that ascends up to the flatter ground on top of Hill of Fare, I followed it for about 0.75 mile before turning back, and I assume it must join up with the main track on top of the Hill of Fare.
- 3) The vehicle track gives way to a grassy "channel", follow this. There is some wind-blow but someone cut off the nasty spiky bits a long time ago so it is easy to duck under or leap over, whichever is your preference.
 - Cross this wire fence, it is not much of a barrier, and then after finding your way through some grassy but wet sections you come up to another wooden fence, leave this to your left (south), there is an easy grassy path through the trees heading west.
 - i) If you are walking this route anti-clockwise at this point take the right (southerly) fork. For clockwise walkers (as described) and you have a compass you will notice you are now walking NNW rather than W.
- 6) As you come out of the trees you reach the old site of Dunswell, the ground is very wet here too, it is still an active spring, turn right (initially NNE) and follow the obvious wellmade track, down slope (NW).
- 7) Watching out for traffic zipping down the hill, cross the metalled B993 road turning slightly right to start walking downhill to Netherlands on the minor (yellow) road.
- 8) Almost immediately after you have passed between the house and the farm buildings at Corquhittachie turn right (NE) towards the field gate and then as you approach the gate you will see to your left an avenue of trees between two walls, turn left again to ascend walking NNW
- 9) When you reach the track leading down from the B993 to Learney House turn right (NE) to walk up this for about 0.75 mile.
 - If you are walking this route anti-clockwise this junction is easily recognisable because it is the first logical place you can turn left (SE) off the track and the cottage at Skerryalva is easily visible across the meadow.
- 10) The gate to the Learney House road has three stars on it, I was curious about that and wondered if it was part of a coat of arms, please get in touch if you have the answer.
 - Again cross the road with care at this point to return to the place you started this walk in the old quarry.

In addition to these instructions we advise you also take OS Landranger Maps 37 & 38, (Strathdon and Aberdeen sheets) with you for additional reference information and also a compass to verify direction information given. Being well sheltered and avoiding farming land it is a good route for families and dog walkers. If you would like to do it as a guided walk please let me know and we can arrange something to suit everybody.

As I wander around the local woods, or gardens, I reflect upon the biodiversity of plant life and other organisms in our environment. Of course this is self evident to those of a botanical or horticultural persuasion. There are many species, which traditionally were considered to be very useful to mankind and to the planet, in times of yore, but perhaps

whose characteristics and functions are now overlooked, or not emphasized in our current thinking.

Mosses are a case in point. There are apparently 977 species of mosses and liverworts in Scotland, and are considered to be a unique part of our biodiversity. A reputable source informs us that 5% of the world's bryophytes are located in Scotland.

Environmentally, mosses have many uses. Located on flood plains, they can absorb flash floods, and on inclines, stabilize



the land. Growing over centuries they lock up carbon, and play a useful part in countering air pollution.

Traditionally, over centuries, moss has been used as a multi purpose packaging for vegetables, and other types of foods, along with bracken and straw. It was utilized as an insulating material in buildings and clothing, and within caulking processes in ships. More recently mosses, with their water retention properties, were used in flower arranging, and gardening. The curative qualities of Sphagnum moss were recognized in World War 1, and wound dressings from this plant were mass produced, for use in hospitals at the time. Traditional Scottish tales tell of wounded deer

heading for the Sphagnum moss beds to recover from their injuries. The writer, Martin Martin, in ' A depiction of the West Highlands of Scotland 1703, recounts, in 1703,

'When they (voyagers)are fatigued by travel or otherwise, they fail not to bathe their feet in warm water wherein red moss has been boiled....'

Lichens tell a similar tale. They are part of our natural environment, which are ignored by many , I presume, much of the time. But traditionally some species have had their uses- as food for humans and animals (deer and sheep)- in North America and Canada predominantly.



(I'm not suggesting a recipe for lichen stew!). Some traditional tales and more recent studies indicate that they may have medicinal applications to counter lung disease and rabies. Japanese studies investigate the possibilities of the use of lichens in reducing tumours. Lichens have been used for many years as dyes for wool in Harris tweeds, and within the processes of perfume production.



As lichens are very slow growing, and acknowledged to be indicators of air pollution, they can be considered a valuable, if diminishing resource, in the context of our planetary biodiversity.

Getting to know ewe...


Having moved to East Bandodle I wanted to get to know my new four legged neighbours a little better. Jess, her friend Millie & I went to visit our two legged neighbours - Marion & Norman Brown, to be introduced to their new



born lambs. We had a lovely time feeding the lambs that needed a little extra help. These lambs are in for a variety of reasons such as their mother's rejecting them, or simply having no milk, to a I lack of milk if they have triplets. The lambs pictured directly below had been born just 15 minutes earlier and were already up and on their feet. Lambing ewes or newly lambed ewe's are often taken in if it is too cold or wet for the new borns to survive. Hypothermia would kill them within 15-20 minutes. On a dry, sunny day lambs are up and about within 5 minutes and feeding and wouldn't have to be taken in unless there was complications at birth or as mentioned, triplets.




Marion explained to us about the need for the lambs to get colostrum as soon as possible so they could build up their immune system. For the girls and I it was wonderful to feed the lambs and cuddle them, however, when Marion pointed out that their next feed was at 9pm and then 5am it wasn't hard to appreciate that this was another pull on a farmer's time at such a busy period.





sticking to their tales, causing flies to lay eggs. If left maggots could form and if not treated can eat a lamb alive.


